The steps for a guided reading lesson are: Before reading: Set the purpose for reading, introduce vocabulary, make predictions, talk about the strategies good readers use. During reading: Guide students as they read, provide wait time, give prompts or clues as needed by individual students, such as "Try that again."

Guided Reading in First Grade – Mrs Jones's Class

Well-sequenced phonics instruction early in first grade has been shown to reduce the incidence of reading difficulty even as it accelerates the growth of the class as a whole. Given this, it is probably best to start all children, most especially in high-poverty areas, with explicit phonics instruction.

As a general rule when a student is reading through a text for the first time, do not interrupt them. Ever. Let them get through it, mistakes and all. Before their second time reading through the text, discuss any unknown words or mistakes made. Then you can model the correct pronunciation for troublesome words or mistakes.

A Small Group, Guided Reading Structure to Combat Decision Fatigue. To combat decision fatigue, AND to help you accelerate all of your readers', I propose a small group, guided reading structure that has served me well for nearly 20 years. Guided reading is all about practice, so have students whisper read (or silently read – in late first grade and second grade) all of the words on their own. That said, some students in Kindergarten or early first grade may need more support than the book introduction in order to be successful with the text.

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
